Introductions and Welcome

Greg Pitchford called the meeting to order and called for a quorum. He then acknowledged the current committee chairs and the past presidents and officers of MOAFS, the North Central Division, and the American Fisheries Society.

Greg then stated that the minutes of the 2016 annual meeting had been posted to the MOAFS website for review and called for any discussion. After no discussion, Greg called for a motion to approve last year's minutes, which was made and seconded. The motion passed with all in favor.

Treasurer's Report

Alex Prentice reported that the MOAFS general account started the year with \$14,349.08 and ended with \$19,541.90 (Attachment 1). Major transactions included those associated with the AFS Conference in Kansas City. Chapter funds were used to open an AFS Conference account; this account was then used to transfer \$11,889.49 in AFS Conference earnings out of PayPal, and ultimately to reimburse AFS \$10,439.03. AFS Conference earnings also were distributed to the SEMO (\$248.31) and MSU (\$183.50) student subunits for their assistance with the conference.

This was the first full year of the Student Support Trust Fund investment strategy. Major transactions of the SSTF included the sale of the 24-month CD #1968 and the purchase of the 48-month CD #2720. A profit of \$188.47 from the sale of CD #1968 was deposited into the SSTF checking account. A sale of shares yielded an additional \$1,399.10 that also was deposited into the SSTF checking account (Attachment 1).

Major transactions associated with the AFS Conference account included a deposit of \$11,500.00 from AFS and the Oregon Chapter as seed money, a withdrawal of \$6,582.00 to purchase t-shirts, a withdrawal of \$2,000.00 for student worker pay, a withdrawal of \$2,913.50 for Joe Tomelleri art sales (who then donated \$1,928.50). As mentioned above for the general account, the chapter then reimbursed AFS \$10,439.03. Once a final closeout of the AFS Conference occurs, the remaining balance of the conference account will be transferred back into the general checking account and will be closed at that time.

In summary, the general accounts began 2016 with a balance of \$14,349.08 and ended the year with \$19,541.90 for a gain of \$5,192.82. The SSTF accounts began 2016 with a balance of \$99,882.26 and ended with \$102,972.47 for a gain of \$3,090.21. With respect to the SSTF budget, the 2016 budget was approved with a deficit, and buffer funds were used to cover the difference. The SSTF budget ended the year with a deficit due to extra expenditures such as financial assistance for students traveling to the AFS Conference.

Finance Committee

Tom Priesendorf presented the 2017 budget (Attachment 2). There are to be no significant changes from the 2016 budget. A motion was made to accept the budget as presented. The motion was seconded and passed with all in favor.

Student Support Trust Fund Budget

Jen Girondo provided additional information on the SSTF budget (Attachment 3). This past year was the first in which the investment strategy had an entire year to perform. The special fund raiser (such as the raffles held during the past two years) was not held in 2016, so the 2017 budget has been adjusted downward to account for the lower income. The goal is to keep at least \$2,500.00 on hand each year for scholarships, so the larger \$2,500.00 scholarship had to be reduced to \$1,000.00 this year.

Alex Prentice added that they will try to keep the large scholarship at \$2,500.00, but they will only budget \$1,000.00 for it and try to make up the remainder with other gifts or through fundraising activities.

Student Support Trust Fund Investment Strategy

Mark Zurbrick shared a presentation showing the performance of the SSTF investments from April 1, 2015 to December 31, 2016. Mark began by providing the membership with a reminder of the history of the strategy, which was approved at the 2015 MOAFS business meeting. Implementation of the strategy included investing \$45,000.00 in two Vanguard total market index funds (75% domestic and 25% foreign markets), which started declining in value almost immediately after purchase (Attachment 4). The funds increased in value later in the year such that \$1,399.00 in shares was sold at a profit. Mark then provided a comparison of what the Chapter's investments would have realized if the \$45,000.00 had been invested in a laddered CD approach. In 2015, when index funds yielded nothing, we would have received \$43.00 in CD dividends. In 2016, however, CDs would have yielded \$351.00, compared to the \$1,399.00 from index funds (a \$1,048.00 difference).

Mark then reported that the committee would like to make some minor adjustments to the strategy to simplify the process. At issue are: 1) distribution of funds during "fat" times; 2) how better to distribute during "lean" times; and 3) modification of the mutual fund profit-taking strategy (e.g. have a set dollar threshold at which profits will be sold, rather than waiting until the end of the year when scholarships are to be awarded).

A motion was made for the Investment Strategy Committee to continue its work and explore the proposed changes. The motion was seconded and passed with all in favor.

Honoring Two MOAFS Members

Greg Pitchford announced that the Outstanding Undergraduate Scholarship will now be known as the "Joe G. Dillard Outstanding Undergraduate Scholarship" to honor Joe's work with students throughout his career. The Citizen's Award has been renamed the "Lee Redmond Citizen's Award" to acknowledge the vast career Lee has had in working with the Missouri Chapter and with Missouri's citizens.

Anglers with Disabilities Committee

Mary Scott reported that about 50 participants attended the fishing event at Maramec Springs in St. James on April 26. In September, about 90 people attended the second annual angler event in Kansas City. In 2017 the Maramec Springs event will be held on April 7, and Rolla will host a fishing event on September 16.

Chapter Historian

Amanda Rosenberger presented an update on chapter history efforts for this past year on behalf of Joe Dillard. They are continuing work on a First 50 Years publication, which thus far includes a forward, history of John Funk, all the chapter minutes, and a listing of officers and NCD presidents.

Continuing Education Committee

The Continuing Education Committee was responsible for 11 workshops at the Kansas City AFS meeting in August, including a course led by Susan Steffen entitled, “Human Dimensions and Conflict Resolution.” A “Missouri Careers in Fisheries” workshop was held at the Missouri Natural Resources Conference on February 2 that was geared toward providing students with insights on a variety of careers available to fisheries professionals. Professionals from several disciplines spoke regarding their career paths. Afterward, students were given the opportunity to discuss career options with each of the panelists during a breakout session. The committee also has plans to host two workshops at the Midwest Fish and Wildlife Conference in Lincoln, Nebraska during the week of February 5. (Secretary’s note 2/14/2017: the “Age and Growth” workshop at the Midwest had to be cancelled due to low enrollment, but the “Data Analysis Using R” course was held, and it was well-attended.)

Information Technology Committee

John Fantz had no updates to pass along. He did request, however, that everyone be sure to let him know of any changes in their contact information so that he can keep the listserv current.

A thank you was also extended to Kat Lackman for her role in managing the online auction for this year’s outdoor adventure trips.

Legislative and Environmental Concerns Committee

Emily Tracy-Smith introduced herself to the membership as the new chair of this committee and spoke of her plans to keep current with the bills during the legislative session. She will work with the Conservation Federation of Missouri (CFM) on bills related to conservation, and she noted that there are a lot of bills being introduced that are similar to last year (e.g. captive cervids, MDC authority, MDC land acquisition). Emily will forward applicable information to the membership via the listserv.

Mark Zurbrick pointed out that the CFM has standing committees, but in the course of reorganization this past year, several of the committee chairs have stepped down, leaving a vacancy. Emily Tracy-Smith has volunteered to take this vacancy. Mark recommended that all Missouri Chapter members should join CFM.

Duane Chapman spoke on behalf of Mark’s long tenure and excellent work as the Legislative and Environmental Concerns Committee Chair. The membership gave Mark a standing ovation in acknowledgement of his years of dedicated service.

Membership Committee

Jennifer Campbell reported that the Chapter currently has 197 members. She also had a few responses for the oft-asked question, “What does MOAFS membership get me?” In answer: 1) a vote at the annual meeting; 2) when the Chapter reaches 250 members, we get a vote with CFM; 3) an opportunity to help in anglers with disabilities events; 4) a chance to work toward student funding needs; 5) acknowledgement of your accomplishments by your fellow members and colleagues.

MNRC Steering Committee

John Ackerson reported that 758 people had registered for this year’s conference and that the room requirement for the resort was met. All of the complimentary rooms that were given to the Chapter were passed along to students who attended the “Missouri Careers in Fisheries” workshop. There were about 45 students who attended the workshop.

MOAFS will host next year’s MNRC from January 31-February 2, 2018 at Tan-Tar-A.

Publicity Committee

Trish Yasger could not be in attendance.

Rivers and Streams Committee

Eric Rahm announced that the committee would be gathering immediately following the MOAFS annual meeting and that anyone interested in the subject of rivers and streams was welcome to attend.

Student Support Committee

Jen Girondo began by recognizing the student members in attendance at the meeting and gave representatives from each of the student subunits a chance to inform the membership of their activities during the past year.

- Southeast Missouri University—Tyler Ham reported that the SEMO subunit had over 200 hours of volunteer work over the past year including fishing clinics, public outreach and pond management clinics. They had students attend the MNRC, the Kansas City AFS meeting, and a Mississippi River meeting.
- University of Missouri-Columbia—Bill Shriener said that members of the FASS held one fundraiser this past year as well as a biomonitoring blitz, attended the Kansas City meeting and the MNRC, and they had members of MOAFS come to their meetings to speak to the group.
- Missouri State University—Jonathan Burkhart said that members of the MSU subunit had sampled fish in a local creek by seining, they toured MDC’s Shepherd of the Hills fish hatchery, worked on vegetation removal from the George Washington Carver pond, and held a stream clean-up event. Jonathan also reported that they had a lot of new members this year.
- University of Central Missouri—Emily Walker reported that membership and attendance at their meetings were higher this year, and that they have a new advisor. The students held a water lily clean up event, and they worked on a stream water quality testing event

using water quality testing, collecting invertebrates, and electrofishing. They participated in a bioblitz, and explored certification opportunities. Emily also said that they are looking for professionals to come to Warrensburg to speak at their meetings.

Jen then presented the following student awards.

- Cheyenne Stratton (UMC) as the first recipient of the Joe G. Dillard Outstanding Undergraduate Scholarship
- Tyler Ham (SEMO) for the MOAFS Student Achievement Award
- Nichole Weedman (MSU) for the MNRC Best Student Aquatics Poster
- Corey Dunn (UMC) for the Joan Duffy Memorial Travel Award

Recipients for the CFM Carl Morrow and Ed Stegner scholarships are still pending, as is the MNRC Best Student Aquatics Platform award.

Newsletter

Emily Tracy-Smith acknowledged Daniel Metcalf for his skills in graphic design that were on display for the latest newsletter. Several remarks were made among the membership regarding the quality of the newsletter and the flattering caricature-esque photos featured in the January 2017 edition.

Special Reports

Kansas City AFS Meeting Update

Vince Travnichek first acknowledged everyone who assisted with the conference. Vince reported that feedback regarding the meeting from attendees was overwhelmingly positive, and we scored highest marks on hospitality and being helpful. The finances of the meeting have not been completely finalized, so the final amount of money the Chapter stands to gain is still pending. Vince anticipated that once the accounts are all finalized with AFS (expected sometime before the end of February), the Chapter should gain between \$10,000.00 and \$11,000.00.

Vince also held a raffle interspersed throughout the meeting, with the prizes mostly being related to the annual meeting (e.g. t-shirts, hats, conference pins). The grand prize winner, however, won a chicken dinner.

Committee for Undergraduate Education

Tom Priesendorf reported that he and the committee worked on the draft undergraduate education white paper prepared by Greg Pitchford and Mark Zurbrick (presented at last year's annual meeting). By coincidence, the August 2016 issue of *Fisheries* addressed this very topic, so much of the work that was slated to be done by this committee was completed. The ultimate goal of the committee work is to create a well-qualified pool of graduates who are ready to enter the work force.

To work toward this goal, the committee members will conduct informal surveys during which hiring managers will be asked their opinions on the classwork they view as valuable to new hires, and what special skill sets they are seeking in people applying for vacancies. Under earlier models, the goal has been to produce graduates who have (or are near attaining) AFS

certification. In contrast, the questions asked of hiring managers for this effort will not be geared toward certification.

To reach the goal of producing qualified graduates who are ready to enter the workforce, the committee plans to let students know of classwork valued by potential employers and develop a framework for educators to address the desires of employers.

Mark Zurbrick pointed out that MOAFS member Quentin Phelps was one of the coauthors of the lead article in the August 2016 issue of *Fisheries* (entitled “Are we preparing the next generation of fisheries professionals to succeed in their careers? A survey of AFS members”).

New Business

No new business was presented.

Election Results

Greg Pitchford announced that Brandon Baumhoer will serve as the new MOAFS Secretary and Clint Hale is the new President-Elect.

Acknowledgement of Outgoing Officers

Greg Pitchford thanked Dave Michaelson for his four years as MOAFS Secretary.

Presentation of Awards

Letters of Recognition were given to the following individuals/groups.

- Vince and Rebecca Travnichek were recognized for Vince’s role as Chair of the 146th AFS Annual Meeting in Kansas City and for Rebecca’s work in her assistance with coordination of the meeting, which hosted over 1,200 in attendance.
- Kara Tvedt and Kenda Flores were recognized for their work in coordinating outreach and educational efforts designed to keep the invasive plant *Hydrilla* at a manageable level in southwest Missouri.
- The Electrofishing Equipment and Safety Committee (Jake Allman, Glenda Branson, Zach Ford [co-chair], Brian McKeage, Rich Meade, Phil Pitts, Kevin Sullivan, Andy Turner, Kyle Winders, and Dave Woods [co-chair]) was recognized for its work in updating MDC’s Electrofishing Equipment and Safety Guidelines Manual. This manual, originally written in 1997, reflects advances in safety and will result in standardization of MDC’s electrofishing equipment.
- The Smallmouth Bass and Rock Bass/Goggle-Eye Work Group (John Ackerson, Jen Gironde, Craig Fuller, Chris Williamson, Kevin Meneau, Mary Scott, Nick Gironde, Dave Woods, Rick Horton, Mike Reed, Paul Cieslewicz, Chris Kennedy, AJ Pratt, Lynn Schrader, Andy Austin, Brian Todd, Bruce Drecktrah, and Michele Baumer) was recognized for its work in revising Smallmouth Bass and Rock Bass/Goggle-Eye fishing regulations to provide sustainable and quality populations for these sport fishes in Ozark streams.
- AJ Pratt, Nathan Recktenwald, and Kenda Flores were recognized for their work in educating professional anglers on the effects of invasive species as they travel from lake to lake to compete. They worked with the Bass Anglers Sportsman’s Society (BASS) to

provide a conservation message and to power wash boats during a televised fishing tournament.

The winners of the A. Stephen Weithman Jr. Leadership Award ([Sherry Fischer](#)) and the John L. Funk Award of Excellence ([Kevin Richards](#)) were announced at the MNRC awards banquet following the annual meeting.

President's Final Comments

Greg Pitchford thanked the membership for all their efforts during the past year and pointed to several highlights that occurred. Chief among those accomplishments was the Chapter's successful hosting of the AFS Annual Meeting; additional high points included updating the Chapter's bylaws, work with the SSTF investment strategy, providing \$5,300.00 in student awards, working with anglers with disabilities, and working with the Conservation Federation of Missouri on advocacy issues.

Greg also recognized the SEMO subunit for being named the Most Active Student Chapter by AFS in 2016.

Greg then handed over the gavel to Tom Priesendorf.

Acknowledgement of Past President

Tom Priesendorf's first order of business was to present a certificate of appreciation to Greg Pitchford as outgoing President.

A motion to adjourn the meeting was made and seconded. All were in favor.

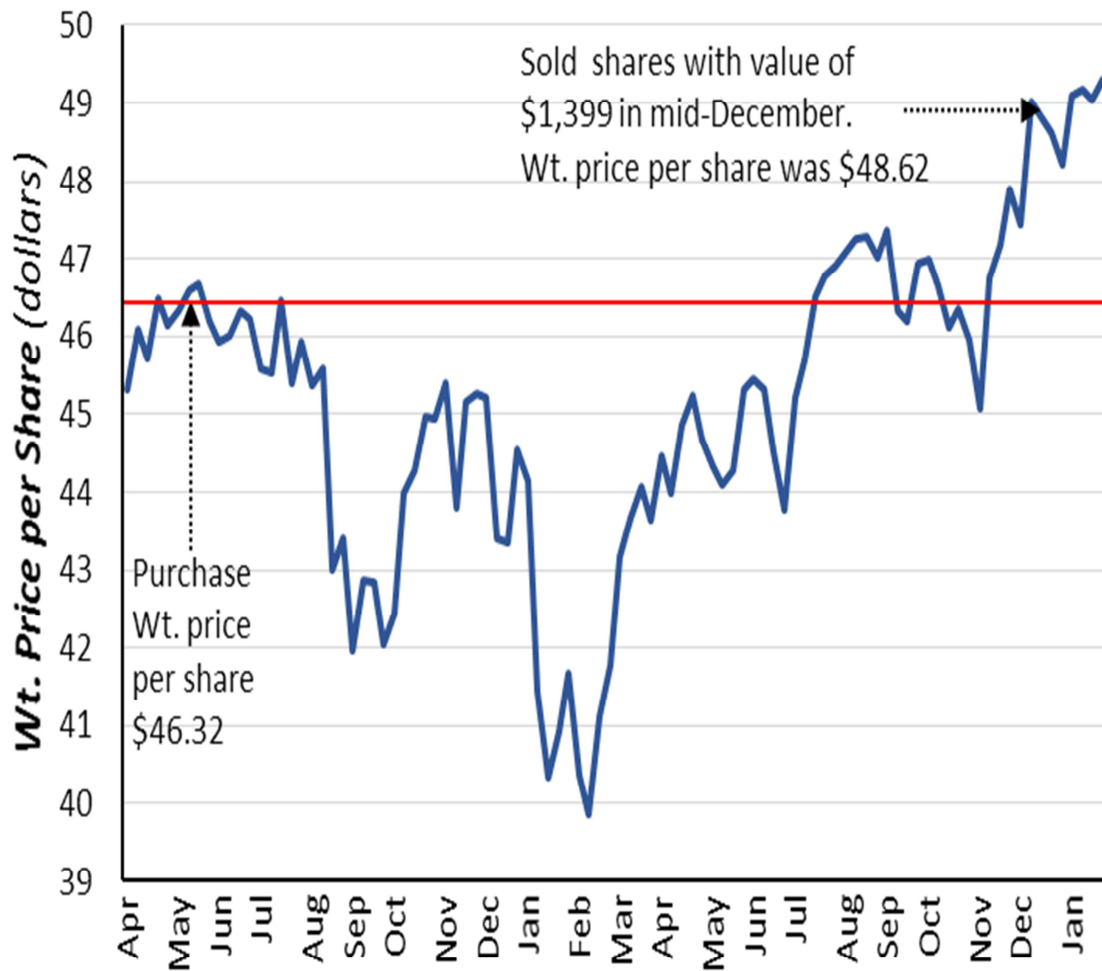

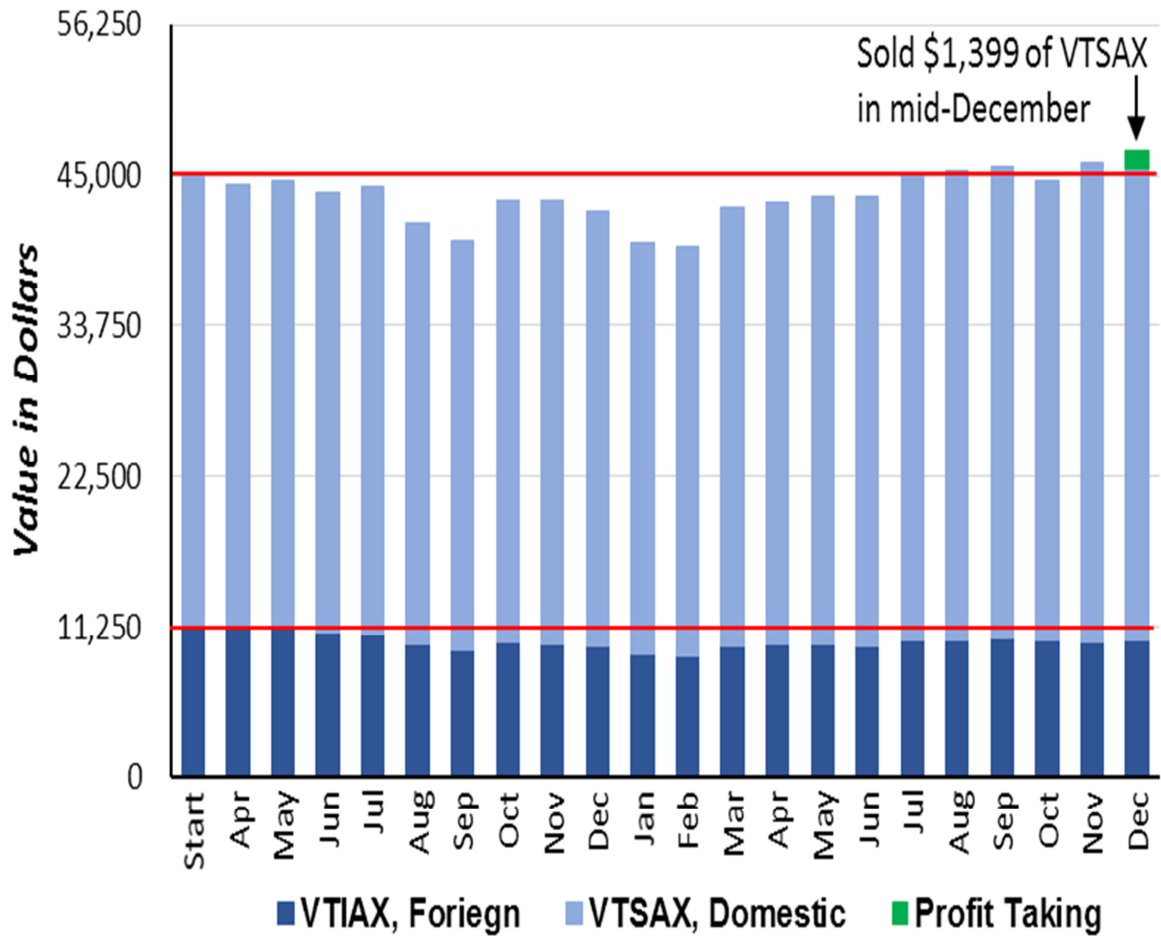
